

SENICA Releases Start Date on New Domestic Violence Batterers Intervention Program

SENICA has recently announced a new addition to their ever-growing list of educational programs. The **Domestic Violence Batterers Intervention Program** is a course that was created by the Duluth Batterer Intervention Project to affect behavioral changes in men with histories of domestic abuse. The program also emphasizes the negative consequences of domestic violence and teaches effective approaches for changing the behaviors that lead to domestic violence.

This program is available in twenty-six week and fifty-two week sessions, and focuses on a variety of issues ranging from understanding the Tactics of Control used by batterers to ending the behaviors that cause them to batter.

This SENICA program, like all of the programs before it, is based on providing students education in a safe, group setting. The group spends approximately three weeks on each topic.

All of SENICA's Instructors have undergone extensive training in accordance with the Duluth model. Additionally, the all have Masters Degrees in social work, psychology or other related fields. "It is very exciting to be part of such a life-changing company. These programs can alter negative behaviors, and help people lead better lives," states Dr. Bryan Weinstein, co-founder of SENICA and practicing psychiatrist for over ten years.

The first SENICA Domestic Violence Batterers Intervention Program is scheduled to start in Madison Heights, Michigan on August 6, 2007.
